

FUNDING FOR PROGRAMS

ESU's operate under two budget constraints. A levy limit of 1.5ϕ per \$100 of actual valuation guides revenue; and an expenditure limit that states the current year's funds (defined as property taxes and state core funds) cannot exceed the prior year's budgeted restricted funds plus state determined growth.

The following graph represents anticipated budgeted receipts received from each funding source in 2015-16. The amount contracted to districts (\$3,354,236) depicts the greatest share of all the sources. This amount is based heavily on services to districts, specifically special education services.



SPECIAL PROJECTS

ESU 2 manages consortium and cooperative programs, such as Title I, Perkins, Special Education, and Distance Education for area schools that choose to participate.



New to the ESU is <u>Pathways 2 Tomorrow</u>. This consortium focuses on career and technical education for six participating schools. This consortium is funded by 1.0¢ per \$100 of actual valuation from each of the participating districts through a 'joint public agency'. Three career pathways are currently being offered: Computer Science, Health Science, and Residential Construction. Future plans are being made to expand these offerings.

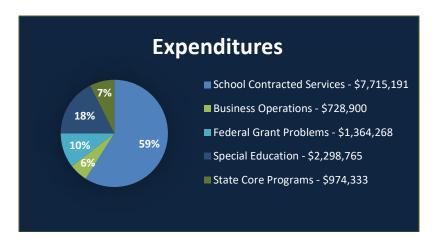
SERVICE AREA

Educational Service Unit 2 provides educational services to sixteen school districts that are located within the counties of Burt, Cuming, Dodge, and Saunders. Several ESU 2 member school districts extend into adjacent counties. As a result, portions of Butler, Cass, Colfax, Douglas, Lancaster, Sarpy, Seward, Stanton, Thurston, Washington, and Wayne counties are included in the ESU 2 service area.



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SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

School districts contract with ESU 2 to provide cooperative special education services for students. Program rates are based on the projected budget needs. As in prior years, an 8% fee is charged for administrative supervision of contracted ESU 2 personnel. The special education department director and consultants provide assistance to all ESU 2 school districts for federally funded programs and for contracted administrative services.

This includes the ESU 2 Special Education Level III Advisory Program for students with behavioral issues. The ESU 2 Independent School began serving students in August 2013. The total number of Special Education Staff Members:
